CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Update on City Engineer/Public Works Director Recruitment

The final filing deadline of January 9, 2004 for applications for City Engineer/Public Works Director has been extended. Recruitment is continuing.

Town participation on Mercury Thermometer Exchange Program

In partnership with the City of Palo Alto, the Town will be participating in the Regional

Water Quality Control Program's thermometer exchange along with Los Altos, Mountain View and East Palo Alto. One of the Bay Area's primary water pollutants concerns is mercury, which has given rise to these efforts to eliminate residential sources of mercury including mercury thermometers. Public Safety officer Steve Garcia will oversee the Town Hall drop-off site to collect old thermometers from residents in exchange for free digital thermometers provided by the Program. Advertisement of the mercury for digital exchange in the local press and other media is scheduled to begin soon.

Parks and Recreation Department Strategic Planning Begins

On January 26, 2004, KCM Consulting Partnership was selected via a Request for Proposals and interview process to assist the Town's Parks and Recreation Committee and staff with the development of a strategic plan for parks and recreation in Los Altos Hills. Public process design work is scheduled to commence in March followed by a key documents and trends scan, needs assessment, facilities inventory and analysis and concluding with the development of a draft five to ten-year strategic action plan for presentation by the Committee to the City Council. Estimated timeline for completion of this scope of work is two to three months. The final plan will reflect facility capacity, community expectations, marketing opportunities and program strategies that are consistent with the Town's core values and resident interests. With Council concurrence and support of the plan, our fledgling Parks and Recreation Department will have a clear road map to assist it in being responsive to the community's needs now and into the future. A progress report on the project will be presented to Council on February 19, 2004 by Parks and Recreation Supervisor Jimmy Forbis.

TOWN COUNCIL SUPPORTS MEASURE B - LIBRARY PARCEL TAX RENEWAL

he Los Altos Hills City Council has voted to endorse Measure B on the March 2 ballot, a renewal of a significant source of income for the Santa Clara County Library (of which Los Altos Hills is part). The original measure was enacted in 1995 to replace funds that the State reallocated from special districts in '92 and '93 to solve its budget shortage.

Measure B money represents more than 1/5 of the library's current operating income and failure to renew it would mean that the library would have to reduce its services by about

25%. The measure asks voters to renew the 1994 parcel tax that provided \$5.3 million annually into eight county branches and a bookmobile with a modest cost of living increase from \$33 per parcel to \$42 per parcel for single-family homes. Measure B would sunset in seven years and requires a 2/3 majority among voters of the district to pass.

RELAY FOR LIFE

The first annual Los Altos Relay for Life will be at Los Altos High School on June 25 & 26, 2004,10:00 AM Saturday to 10:00 AM Sunday. Los Altos Hills residents are encouraged to participate.

Relay for Life is the signature event of the American Cancer Society. It is the largest fundraiser in the world, and it is a 100% volunteer-driven event. Participating teams, led by team captains, walk around the high school track for 24 hours to demonstrate their resolve in battling this disease. Luminaries will be sold in honor/memory of someone with cancer and provide light during the night around the track. Great entertainment is planned for this worthwhile event.

The purposes of Relay for Life are, in addition to fundraising, to educate participants and attendees about cancer prevention and early detection, to make the community aware of the Society's research programs and services, and to celebrate and honor cancer survivorship. Relay for Life especially honors those who have lost their battle with cancer.

Cancer survivors are encouraged to get involved and are invited to walk the first lap of the relay. Volunteers are needed to organize teams, to participate in teams, to work at Relay for Life, and to contribute needed equipment and supplies. Sponsors are welcomed.


TOWN OF LOS ALTOS HILLS FENCE ORDINANCE - PUBLIC HEARINGS

n Thursday, March 11th, 2004, on or after 7:00 p.m., the Planning Commission will consider amending the Zoning Ordinance in order to revise Zoning standards for fences, walls, gates, and columns.

On Thursday, April 1st, 2004, on or after 6:30 p.m., the City Council will consider the Planning Commission's recommendation and public testimony with regard to the proposed Fence Ordinance.

The Planning Commission and City Council will consider the following changes to the Fence Ordinance:

- Consolidation of fence rules into a single ordinance
- Introduction of a six (6') foot average height and seven (7') maximum height for "open" driveway gates



- Standards for deer fencing and open space-conservation easement perimeter fencing
- Establishment of prohibited fence types

PATHWAY COMMITTEE 2004 NEW PEOPLE, NEW PROJECTS

here is much happening in the town Pathway Commit tee and 2004 promises to be a busy year. We have a larger Committee, several new members, a new Chairman and a number of new projects underway.

Last Spring, the Town Council expanded the size of the Pathway Committee to eleven members. Faced with a growing

number of projects and initiatives, the Council felt more Committee members would provide the extra volunteer time and resources to help the Committee achieve its goals. New members include Dick Cassam, Nancy Ginzton and Chris Vargas. In addition, Chris Vargas was elected Chairman at the



annual re-election meeting. Thank you to Dubose Montgomery for his hard work as Chairman for FY'02-03.

The Committee has a number of goals and initiatives for the 2003-2004 fiscal year. These include:

- 1. Update the town pathway map. The Committee will review our current pathway network and recommend changes necessary to promote its development, maintenance and enjoyment by all residents. A number of special meetings will take place over the next several months as part of this update project. Resident input is key to the success of this important project!
- 2. Improve existing pathways. The Committee created a new way of identifying and prioritizing maintenance and upgrade of town pathways. We maintain and regularly update a list of paths that need substantial improvement. Each project is prioritized and recommended for implementation, as funds are available. The list is reviewed and updated at our first meeting each quarter (Jan, Mar, Jul, Oct).
- **3.** Create new, accurate maps for residents. We are working on a new map that is color-coded, easy to read and accurate. Thanks to the tremendous work of the Ad-Hoc Pathway Map Committee, we are very close to having a highly accurate pathway map.
- **4. Encourage resident input.** Ever noticed a path that needs maintenance work? Have you ever walked a path and reached a point where you weren't sure where to turn next? Have a creative idea on how to improve our pathway network? The best ideas come from those who use the paths, and we launched a new "resident report" form to help turn your ideas into projects. Please pick up a form from our city staff. Or send an email to any of the Pathway Committee members. We'd like to hear from you!

In addition, there are a few more interesting programs "inthe-works" that we hope to announce this year.

In closing, 2004 will be a busy year for the Pathway Committee. We welcome your ideas, feedback and suggestion to help us continually improve our pathway network. We welcome you to attend our meetings and share your comments in person. The Pathway Committee meets the 4th Monday of every month, at 7 PM, in the Town Chambers meeting room.

FINANCIAL OPTIONS FOR UNDERGROUNDING UTILITIES

n the last newsletter we reviewed the benefits of undergrounding our wires. Few residents disagree with the benefits, but many worry about the cost. Here's an overview of some of the cost issues and options.

Financing an undergrounding project in our town is a big challenge. We have 64 miles of overhead lines throughout the

town, and it will cost roughly \$50M to bury them all, right up to each house. This figure is based on the latest estimates by R. W. Beck & Associates, an engineering firm with extensive experience in undergrounding and municipal utility



projects. We believe it is a reasonable planning estimate, but it is not a fixed bid.

A sizeable cost, certainly, but an important aspect of this estimate is that it assumes the project is done for the entire town in a staged but integrated package, not as series of independent projects undertaken by individual neighborhoods. The integrated approach would take 3-5 years, and offers significant economies of scale reflected in the \$50M figure; the piecemeal approach - a typical route taken by other cities - will be far more costly per parcel.

If we were to spread the total cost equally across the town's 3000 parcels, each owner would be billed about \$17,000. While many residents are willing & able to pay this much for the benefits of undergrounding, many others could not, even with low-interest financing. The 2000 census indicates that a significant percentage of our residents are retired and on a fixed budget. Our goals for undergrounding are to beautify and upgrade our town, not to bankrupt neighbors. So even if a majority supported this "equal payments" method, it does not make sense for our town.

Another approach is to use a municipal funding instrument called a Benefits Assessment District. Tiburon, Manhattan Beach and Hermosa Beach are using it for their undergrounding projects, but in our case it would shift much of the financial burden of the project to those in the town who could least afford it. So again, this is not a good option for us.

It seems the best option to underground our town is to use a General Assessment. While this approach will require 2/3rds voter support, homeowners would pay an amount proportional to their own property taxes. With a General Assessment, homeowners would likely see a 10% increase in their current annual property tax bill for a period of 20-25 years.

Sound reasonable? We think so. You'll hear more about it in the coming months; until then please let us know if you have questions or comments.

dventure is right here in our own backyard! Explore the hills and valleys of Los Altos Hills this Spring by stepping out on our Pathway system. Join me every second weekend on the Apricots to Mountain Tops hike where you'll enjoy sweeping vistas, historic places, an educational farm, unique riparian habitats, and expansive wilderness within open space preserves.

On Saturdays, lace up your boots and bring plenty of water and lunch for a challenging 8-mile loop. We'll take marked Pathways through the Town that connect to wilderness trails in MidPen Open Space. During this exceptionally scenic hike, we'll walk though the Packard Orchards, Byrne Preserve, Hidden Villa, along Adobe Creek, and up the Grapevine Trail to Rhus Ridge and Windmill Pasture. We'll amble back to our starting point via marked Paths. This approximately 4-hour hike is challenging but not difficult. It's a great way to learn how to use Pathways to connect to the vast array of trails through other jurisdictions.

On Sundays, we'll enjoy a shorter and moderately challenging version of this hike. We'll take a 5-mile loop that includes Packard Orchards, Byrne Preserve, and Hidden

FIRE SEASON - HOT UPON US!

he fire season is fast approaching! It is imperative that homeowners take steps to protect their homes from risks from partial or total fire loss. The Fire Department of Santa Clara County recommends the following:

- A. All flammable vegetation must be cleared a minimum of 30 feet around structures. Ornamental shrubbery and trees cleared of dead leaves and branches. Note: grading is prohibited by ordinance within the Town of Los Altos Hills prior to April 1st. Due to the increased erosion potential; discing is considered to be a form of grading and similarly prohibited. (Note: The LAH Environmental Design Committee recommends mowing to remove weeds, rather than discing because of the potential for erosion.)
- B. Roofs, eaves and rain gutters must be cleared of pine needles, leaves, or other dead or dying wood.
- C. Tree limbs shall be cut within 10 feet of chimneys and/or stovepipes. Dead limbs hanging over the house or garage must be trimmed.
- D. Chimney outlets or flues shall be covered with a spark arresting 1/2" mesh screen.
- E. Address shall be clearly visible for easy identification in an emergency.
- F. Trees 18 feet or taller should be limbed to 6 feet up from the ground.
- G. Woodpiles should be stacked a minimum of 30 feet from buildings, fences, and other combustible materials.
- H. All vegetation and other flammable materials should be cleared from beneath decks. Elevated decks should be enclosed with fire resistive materials.

Should you have a question about the compliance of your property with the required fire safety regulations, call the Fire Prevention Division of the SCC Fire Department at (408) 378-4010 to schedule an inspector to meet with you at your property. A Hillside Fire Survival Information Packet is available upon request.

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
